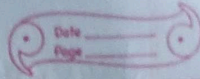

A **relative pronoun** refers to or relates to a noun used earlier in the sentence.
EXAMPLE: Mamta has found the pen **which** she had lost. (**which** stands for pen.)

Reflexive pronouns are used when the action done by the subject reflects upon the subject. Some reflexive pronouns are myself, yourself, himself, herself, itself, ourselves, yourselves and themselves.

EXAMPLE: I hurt **myself**.

An **emphatic pronoun** is used with a noun or pronoun. An emphatic pronoun is used for the sake of emphasis. Some emphatic pronouns are myself, himself, yourself, herself, yourselves, itself, ourselves and themselves.

EXAMPLE: Only you **yourself** can explain it to me.

Reflexive and emphatic pronouns always end in **self** (or **selves** in the plural).

Sometimes it is difficult to decide when to use **I** or **me** in a sentence. If in doubt, divide the sentence into two short sentences.

EXAMPLE: Mike is going to the circus. I am going to the circus.

So the correct usage is: Mike and I are going to the circus.

Jack told Sally to get off the grass. Jack told **me** to get off the grass.

So the correct usage is: Jack told Sally and **me** to get off the grass.
