

An **adverb** is a word that adds meaning to a verb, an adjective or another adverb.

EXAMPLES: Mahesh walked **briskly**.

The park is **quite** nice.

Akshay recited the poem **rather** well.

Adverbs of manner show **how** something happened.

EXAMPLES: Parvez worked **quickly**.

Dina spoke **softly**.

Most adverbs of manner are formed by adding **ly** to an adjective.

EXAMPLES: slow – slowly, quiet – quietly, neat – neatly
